## **Interview Questions**

- 1. Tell me what comes to mind when you hear the term care coordination.
- 2. Have you provided any coordination support for families with children 8 years or younger experiencing social or economic adversity?
  - a. (If yes) Tell me about the support you provide to coordinate care.
    - i. What do you do?
    - ii. How long does it take?
    - iii. How do you document the coordination you provide?
    - iv. Who else is involved?
      - 1. How does your team or organization support care coordination?
    - v. What do they do?
    - vi. How is information shared?
      - 1. *Probe:* internally, with other organizations
    - vii. Are there any documents that inform how you coordinate care? (*Probe:* policies, guidelines, clinical practice standards, orientation documents)
    - viii. Is there anything else you do to ensure your patient/client receives the care they need?
  - b. (If no) Tell me why you didn't provide support to coordinate care (*Probe:* haven't had the opportunity, time)
    - i. If you were to provide support in coordinating care, what would you do?
    - ii. How much time would it take?
    - iii. How would you document the coordination you provide?
    - iv. Who else is involved?
      - 1. How does your team or organization support care coordination?
    - v. What do they do?
    - vi. How is information shared? (*Probe:* internally, with other organizations)
    - vii. Are there any documents that inform how you coordinate care? (*Probe:* policies, guidelines, clinical practice standards, orientation documents)
    - viii. Is there anything else you do to ensure your patient/client receives the care they need?

- c. Can you tell me about a time when coordinating care did not go well?
  - i. What were the challenges?
  - ii. What could be different or improved?
- a. What do you think restricts care coordination? (*Probe:* in general, in your community, in your practice)
- 5. After answering these questions, how would you define care coordination?

## Demographics
